A Brief Archaeological Sketch of the Moundville Archaeological Park

The Moundville site, occupied from around A.D. 1000 until A.D. 1450, is a large settlement of Mississippian culture on the Black Warrior River in central Alabama. At the time of Moundville's heaviest residential population, the community took the form of a three-hundred-acre village built on a bluff overlooking the river.

The plan of the town was roughly square and protected on three sides by a bastioned wooden palisade. Moundville, in size and complexity second only to the Cahokia site in Illinois, was at once a populous town, as well as a political center and a religious center.

Within the enclosure, surrounding a central plaza, were twenty-six earthen mounds, the larger ones apparently supporting noble's residences alternating with small ones that supported buildings used for mortuary and other purposes.

Of the two largest mounds in the group, Mound A occupies the center of the great plaza, and Mound B lies just to the north on the site's central axis. The latter is a steep pyramid with two ramps, rising to a height of fifty-eight feet. The arrangement of the mounds and plaza gives the impression of symmetry and planning. In addition, archaeologists have found evidence of borrow pits, other public buildings, and dozens of small houses constructed of pole and thatch, many of which have yielded burials beneath the floors.

Striking differences between the nobles and commoners showing a highly stratified society can be seen among the excavated burials with their grave goods. Some include rare artifacts that may be associated with particular political or religious offices. Evidence shows that Moundville was sustained by tribute of food and labor provided by the people who lived in the nearby Black Warrior Valley floodplain farmsteads as well as other smaller mound centers. At its height the Moundville community contained a population of about one thousand with around ten thousand in the entire valley. Like other Mississippian societies, Moundville's growth and prosperity were made possible by intensive cultivation of maize, or Indian corn. The nobility dominated the traffic in such imported luxury goods as copper, mica, galena, and marine shell. Renowned particularly for their artistic excellence in pottery, stonework, and embossed copper, the inhabitants of Moundville produced artifacts bearing a high degree of skilled workmanship, making the site a benchmark in the study of Mississippian imagery.

Neither the rise of Moundville nor its eventual decline is well understood by scholars. The immediate area appears to have been thickly populated, containing a few very small single-mound centers just before the creation of the public architecture of the great plaza and erection of the palisade about A.D. 1200. However, by about A.D. 1350, Moundville seems to have undergone a change in use. The site lost the appearance of a town but retained its ceremonial and political functions. A decline ensued, marked by abandonment of some mounds and the loss of religious importance in others. There was also a decrease in the importation of goods which had given prestige to the nobility. By the 1500s, most of the area was abandoned with only a few portions of the site still occupied. Although the first Europeans reached the Southeast in the 1540s, the precise ethnic and linguistic links between Moundville's inhabitants and what became the historic Native American tribes are still not well understood.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL

ENCAMPMENT FEE:

Participation fees will be \$15.00 per person (youth and adult). The fee includes park admission, insurance, program supplies, awards, and each participant will receive a 100TH Anniversary Encampment patch. Only properly registered Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers may attend. Youth Protection guidelines must be followed by all units!

REGISTRATION

1. Every Unit (Packs, Troops, Crews, Posts) should complete the enclosed "Participation Form" and submit it to the McAbee Scout Service Center **no later than October 19th, 2022**. An online registration form will be available on the Black Warrior Council website (<http://www.bwc-bsa.org>).
2. Registration does not cover food costs for your unit. Each unit may bring their own supplies and food for the weekend or later in this Guide you will find an option to participate in a meal plan at an additional cost. To participate in the full meal plan for the weekend (Saturday breakfast through Sunday breakfast), units must complete that information and payment **no later than October 7th**. We will be unable to accommodate request for the full meal plan after October 7th.
3. Upon arrival at the Encampment, unit leaders should have an updated and final "Unit Roster" completed with actual participant names (youth and adult). Any final payments for participants will be collected at that time.

VISITORS & ALUMNI

Parents, and guests from your unit are encouraged to visit. Each unit is encouraged to reach out and make every effort to have your unit alumni to attend as well. We would love to see as many alumni as possible to attend during the day on Saturday and remain for the Arena Show that evening. Visitors and alumni must enter through the main gate and there will be a \$6.00 charge (reduced rate from normal park fees).

UNIFORMS

The full official Scout uniform will be the dress of the day for Saturday, October 29th. It is understood that some Scouts who have just joined Scouting may not have a full uniform, however, all others (youth and adults) should be in full uniform all day on Saturday. Order of the Arrow members are encouraged to have their OÅ Sash for wear during the Aracoma Lodge rededication ceremony Saturday evening to occur after the Arena Show.

DIRECTIONS TO THE MOUNDVILLE ARCHAEOLOGICAL PARK

From Tuscaloosa, travel South on Highway 69 to the city of Moundville. This is about a 20-minute drive. Once you enter the Moundville city limits, you will see signs directing you to the main gate for the park. Once you enter the park, you will be met at the main gate with parking directions, a map & schedule of all activities, and other information you may need.

PARK RULES

It is critically important that all Cubs, Scouts, and guests are mindful that we are in a historic location and our actions need to honor and respect the significance of the Moundville Archaeological Park. Rules that need to be followed by all are listed below.

1. DO NOT DIG OR COLLECT ARTIFACTS.
2. Moundville is an active archaeological site protected by state and federal laws. Looters will be prosecuted.
3. Climb only Mounds with steps.
4. Keep vehicles on paved roadways at all times. Four wheelers, dirt bikes, and other unregistered vehicles are prohibited in the Park. **The 100th Anniversary Encampment is a walking event!** All vehicles must be parked in a designated parking area. Units that are camping will be allowed vehicle access to the camping area only to unload equipment (once unloaded, the vehicle will have to be parked in the parking lot. Units arriving for just for the day on Saturday will be directed to the parking area and walk to the program areas.
5. Visitors must stay on marked trails or open areas.
6. Obey posted speed limits and traffic signs.
7. Alcoholic beverages, Firearms, or Smoking is not allowed on Park property.
8. No swimming or River Access is allowed from Park property.
9. Dogs must be leashed at all times, except in the pet play area near the Park Campground
10. The Park's official and permanent campground and bath house are only for registered campers to the Park (not for Scouting units).
11. NO OPEN FIRES OR FLAMES. We ask that each unit provide stoves and needed equipment for cooking.

CAMPING FOR THE WEEKEND

Scout units are encouraged to camp for the entire weekend and Cub Packs are welcome to do so as well. There will be special camping areas for units that are camping. Please be aware of the following as you plan for the weekend.

- Units will be assigned a campsite on a first-come, first-served basis. Sites will allow for plenty of room for tents and equipment. Troop gateways are not part of this year's Encampment; however, units should make some sign/display so visitors will know your unit's number and hometown.
- There will be water access locations close to each camping area, but units are encouraged to arrive with full water storage containers.
- Fires are not permitted in the camping area so please plan to bring stoves and needed equipment for cooking in the campsite.
- Porta-potties will be located close to the camping areas and throughout the park activity areas.
- As this is a historic location with significant archaeological attributes, holes may not be dug anywhere in the park. Normal size tent stakes will be fine.
- Units must be familiar with and follow the *Youth Protection* policies of the B.S.A.

COMING FOR THE DAY?

1. Please review the Encampment Schedule of Events and plan your arrival so that you will have plenty of time to check-in, park, and walk to the Opening Ceremony that begins at 9:00.
2. We encourage every effort to be made to carpool and for units to arrive as one group. Traveling in caravans is not the safest method. It is recommended that units make travel plans so that they can arrive in plenty of time, stage at a close location before entering the park, and once all are assembled, proceed into the park as one group. This will greatly facilitate our ability to process day participants in an efficient and timely manner for all. The main unit leader with a final roster should be in the lead vehicle.
3. Food for the day may be brought and units will be provided locations to eat. Please bring garbage bags so that all trash can be collected and left in trash locations in the Park for appropriate disposal. Day units may wish to take advantage of the food trailer and concessions, however, be advised that there may be limitations on the amount of food and type available.

FOOD MEAL PLAN OPTIONS FOR UNITS

As discussed above, Units may choose to bring their own food and equipment to prepare food in their campsite, or they may choose to purchase a meal plan for the weekend. Please use the “Food Meal Plan Order Form”, or online link from the Black Warrior Council’s website to participate in the meal plan. Units participating in the meal plan **must submit this order form, along with payment in full no later than Friday, October 7th!**

- The meal plan for the weekend is \$25 per person.
- The meal plan includes the following meals: Saturday breakfast (traditional type breakfast), Saturday lunch (hot box lunch), Saturday supper (BBQ dinner), and Sunday breakfast (grab and go hot breakfast).
- Special dietary needs may be included on the order form.
- Saturday breakfast, supper, and Sunday breakfast will be picked up in a bulk pack for return to the campsite for consumption.
- Saturday lunch will be picked up on an individual basis with participants identified by a color-coded arm band. Times for pick-up will be distributed upon arrival at the Encampment.
- Units will need to bring Igloo water coolers to mix and distribute the drink for meals.

There will be a concession stand operating throughout the Encampment. Since there will be no pre-orders for this option, availability of food and options will be based upon demand and availability.



Program Information for Cub Scouts

Lions, Tigers, Cubs, and Webelos will have a great day with plenty to see and do at the *2022 Black Warrior Council 100th Celebration Encampment*. A typical day for your Pack will include:

- Opening Ceremony at 9:00 A.M.
- Visiting and participating in the *Cub Activities* during the morning and afternoon program times.
- Stay for the evening Arena Show at 8:00 P.M.

Cub Scouts will celebrate 100 years of Scouting in the Black Warrior Council and wonder what Cub Scouts will look like in another 100 years, possibly even on the Moon!

There will be a Round Robin event for Cubs with a shot gun start. Activities will include:

- The Moon Walk to the All-Aboard
- Space Arrows
- Moon Crystal Catch
- Robots
- Sling Shots
- Leave No Trace on the Moon
- Rockets Demo

Each Den is encouraged to create from cardboard boxes/tape a unique spaceship or Moon lander. Cubs decorate each as they want but must include their Pack, Den Number, and have a nickname. Cub crewed ships must transport all the Cubs in the Den (large Dens can build more than one) from station to station, survive the day and arrive at Moon Base safely. A panel will judge the best in class for awards in Design, Decoration and Nickname.

Take off is optional but fun is mandatory!




